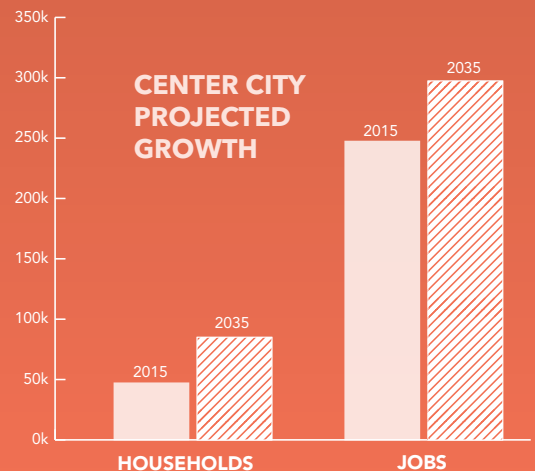

Seattle is the center of a growing region.

Ranked in the top five fastest growing cities in the nation for the past three years, most of Seattle's growth is happening in Center City. In fact, Center City is home to more than 60,000 people and 250,000 jobs—that's nearly half the jobs in Seattle!

More growth is coming and public and private investment within Center City is at an all-time high.

By 2035, an additional 56,000 jobs and 25,000 households are expected in Center City neighborhoods. Residential and commercial buildings are going up at a record pace—65 projects are currently in the works.



People need new and better ways to get to the places they want to go.

Nearly 230,000 people commute in and out of Center City each day from all over Seattle and the Puget Sound region. Many thousands more come to Center City to shop, attend cultural events, or enjoy our world-class public spaces.

Transit demand continues to grow even as the City of Seattle and King County Metro have added new bus service in Seattle and Sound Transit opened Link service between University of Washington and Downtown. These investments are one piece of the puzzle that we need to solve to help people **move** through, **connect** to, and **experience** Center City.



New transportation and public space projects are coming to help meet growing demand.

- 1 Madison Street Bus Rapid Transit line
- 2 New streetcar lines connecting South Lake Union, downtown, Pioneer Square, and Capitol Hill
- 3 20 acres of new and improved public space along Seattle's central waterfront
- 4 Sound Transit Link Light rail extensions to Northgate, Bellevue, Overlake, Kent/Des Moines, and Lynnwood
